Emergency Preparedness - Not Just For Tsunamis

March 11, 2016 marked the five year anniversary of the 2011 devastating 9.0 earthquake in Japan - one of the most powerful earthquakes ever recorded.

The earthquake initiated a deadly tsunami that killed thousands of people and left thousands of others injured and homeless.

It is hard to believe an event of similar magnitude could happen here, but the fact is ... it can, and it is predicted to happen.

Earthquakes and tsunamis are not the only hazards that the Oregon coast faces. Hurricane force winds and heavy rains have also caused significant damage and outages in the past.

No matter what the event (natural disaster, house fire, stranded in a snow storm, or your car breaks down), being prepared for any emergency can mean the difference in life and death for you and your family.

Getting by without electricity for a few days or weeks is doable, but people cannot survive without adequate food, water, shelter, and everyday necessary medications.



If you and your family have not yet made a disaster plan, packed an emergency go kit for every family member (and a vehicle pack), and practiced what to do in the event of an emergency, please start today. Wishing you would have had a plan and the necessary life-saving supplies in the face of a real emergency is too late.

Elections Are Approaching - Are You Registered To Vote?

As with every general election year, candidates are heavily campaigning and vying for your vote. The 2016 primary election will be held on Tuesday, May 17th; the general election will be held on Tuesday, November 8th. Any U.S. citizen age eighteen and older may register to vote.

Local History Resources Are Available at the CIT Library

A patron interested in learning more about the history of the city of Coquille and the surrounding area visited the CIT Library. The visitor came to the Tribe's library because she was researching the Athabaskan dialect speaking Upper Coquille villages in that area. What better place to go, right? To properly research Coos County history, you have to research the first peoples who lived here.

So while helping her with her research, I thought of some of our Library's resources focusing on local history after the arrival of pioneers and settlers.

Pioneers and Incidents of the Upper Coquille Valle, Alice Woolridge – Several local history collections are anthologies of newspaper clippings and journal entries. This book is a collection of remembrances from pioneers who moved to eastern Coos County in the 19th century.

There are many accounts in this book of exchanges pioneers had with the area's original settlers (Upper Coquille); not all of them bad.

A Century of Coos and Curry, Emil Peterson and Alfred Powers – Alfred Powers is the founder of the city of Powers: an area occupied by Upper Coquille and other native peoples for thousands of years. The book offers stories, biographies and photographs of local communities and their residents. Glasgow and Norway are located in Coos County and this book proves it. Several chapters are dedicated to individuals and events involving ancestors of the Coos and Coquille tribes. While some of the accounts are to say the least questionable, such as the story of Battle Rock, this book is still used as a resource by members of

the Tribe's community.

The Coos Bay Region, 1890 - 1944, Nathan Douthit – "Life On A Coastal Frontier" is the subtitle for this local history. The author has several titles exploring the relationships between native peoples and settlers in southwest Oregon and was a guest speaker and one of the Tribe's culture conferences. This book focuses on the major industries of the time such as logging and shipping and includes over 100 historic photographs.

Bandon By The Sea, Dow Beckham – The infamous fire that razed Bandon in 1936 is one of the subjects covered in this book about the city built on the former site of the Nasomah village complex. Written in 1981, the book includes interviews with many survivors of those fires plus biographies of many of the city's early civic and business leaders.



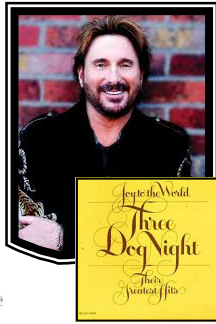

Practice Good Safety Habits to Keep Your Home and Family Safe

Being safe in our community is something that is easily taken for granted. There is little crime in the Kilkich community and most residents are familiar with the other community members.

In reality, there are many people who are not Kilkich residents that frequent our community on a daily basis - traffic off of Cape Arago drives through the neighborhoods either visiting family/friends or just curious to see what is up here; a variety of people come up to catch the CCAT bus; kids and adults ride their bikes up the hill to ride the paved areas; non-residents walk their dogs around the loop or use the loop as an exercise area.

Having unknown people in the neighborhood is normal and no

cause for concern, however, it is ALWAYS wise to practice good safety habits at ALL TIMES to keep your home and family safe.

- Keep external doors locked even when you are at home
- NEVER open your door to a stranger; teach your children the same or always have an adult greet visitors
- Leave a porch light on at night so you can see out the peep hole
- Keep perimeter around home clean and tidy so that it does not provide a hiding place
- Secure your home when you leave (doors and windows) and use a range of lights on timers so that your home always looks occupied

- Keep your vehicles locked
- Walk with a buddy; carry your cell phone
- Always let someone know where you are going and when you will be back
- Be aware of your surroundings at all times



The above tips are just a few safety habits to practice. Use common sense when it comes to safety and don't become complacent. Crime is everywhere, but we can deter the criminals by practicing safe habits.
