Community dumpsters will be placed on Tribal Lands on Friday, August 25th. The dumpsters are for the EXCLUSIVE USE OF KILKICH RESIDENTS ONLY.

Items NOT allowed in the dumpsters include, but are not limited to, antifreeze, appliances, batteries, digital devices, electronics, glass, motor oil, paint, solvents, and tires. If you are unsure if an item can be discarded in the dumpster, please contact CIHA at 541-888-6501.

Please recycle all recyclable material (plastic, newspaper magazines, tin cans, etc.).
Recycling helps conserve natural resources, reduces the need for landfill space, and helps to lessen pollution and greenhouse gas

emissions. A community recycling bin is located next to the Tribal Police Department at 2602 Mexeye Loop. Please do not put plastic bags in the recycle bin.

Recycle your computers, monitors, TVs, printers, keyboards, and mice at an Oregon E-Cycles location.

Some of you in the Kilkich community may not know the Tribe updated its website.

Go to: www.coquilletribe.org; find the "COMMUNITY" tab on top of the page; scroll down to "PUBLIC SERVICES"; and click.

The "PUBLIC SERVICES" website includes information on the Coquille Tribal Community Fund, the Tribal Police Department, and the Coquille Indian Tribe Library.

Now, without further ado, we'll look at some of these resources.

Growing up Indian: An Emic Perspective

Dr. George Wasson's biographical thesis describes the historical and contemporary experiences of the Coquille Indian Tribe and their close neighbors. The work includes many historical and traditional stories including an extended version of "Coyote and the Strawberries".

Considering the Coquille taboo regarding telling Coyote stories in summer, maybe wait until winter to read this thesis.

Brush Fences and Basket Traps

Dr. Scott Byram's focus on how the Coquille and other Oregon coastal tribes caught salmon and other fish. He focuses on fish weirs, the fence-like structure built across rivers and creeks to corral and capture a variety of fish species. Remains of these weirs are scattered throughout the Coquille Indian Tribe's traditional territory.

The Takelma and Their Athapascan Neighbors



Dennis Gray's work focuses on the native peoples who lived in the Rogue River drainage in southwestern

Oregon. This includes the Takelma, Da-du-be-te-de (from the Applegate River area), and the Tal-tuc-tun-te-da (from the Galice Creek area).



Total Solar Eclipse over Oregon on August 21

On Monday, August 21, 2017, a total eclipse of the Sun will take place as the Moon completely blocks the Sun's light and daylight turns to twilight as the Sun, Moon, and Earth line up to reveal the Sun's atmosphere - the corona. The last total solar eclipse in Oregon was in 1979; the last total solar eclipse across the U.S. was in 1918. The eclipse will start at the coast shortly before 10:15 a.m. and the sun will be totally blocked out (in the area shown on the map below) by 10:17 a.m. The eclipse will cross Oregon in the span of about 10 minutes and will continue to move east. If you want to witness the "total" eclipse, you must be in the path shown on the map below. Otherwise, you will witness a partial solar eclipse. The solar eclipse will cross 14 states from the Pacific to the Atlantic.

If you will be viewing the solar eclipse, be sure you have proper eye protection to prevent serious eye damage. Sunglasses do NOT provide adequate protection; eclipse viewers are recommended.
