Wildfire Smoke and Your Health Article excerpted from Oregon Health Authority

When smoke levels are high, even healthy people may have smoke-related symptoms or health issues. The best thing to do is limit your exposure to smoke. Keep indoor air as clean as possible by keeping windows and doors closed and using a high efficiency HEPA air filtration unit to clean indoor air. Reduce time spent outdoors; avoid vigorous outdoor activity; drink LOTS of water; avoid smoking, using wood-burning stoves/fireplaces, burning candles, incenses, or vacuuming. Listen to your body and contact your health care provider or dial 911 if you are experiencing serious health symptoms.

"PAPER BOY" WAS MOST POPULAR COURSE AT 11TH ANNUAL BICYCLE SAFETY RODEO

The 11th annual Bicycle Safety Rodeo held on Saturday, August 12th had approximately 20 participants. Seven cone courses were set up for participants to navigate. The most popular (and fun) course was "paper boy" where participants were given five newspapers to deliver along a narrow cone course. The course required the rider to multitask (reaching into the bike basket, removing a newspaper, and then tossing the newspaper a distance into a target basket without stopping or placing a foot down) while maintaining control of their bike. Whitney Summers held the record with 4 out of 5 of



her newspapers successfully hitting the target basket; her brother, Jake Summers, was a close second.

There were enough prizes that everybody took home a prize; several people took home two prizes JJ Gideon took home the main prize - a tricycle scooter. Prizes included two bike bubble machines, two Hot Wheels race tracks, ten \$10 gift cards from Wal-Mart, and a lot of bicycle safety lights.

Another Way the River Has

Award winning Oregon author Robin Cody writes extensively about living in Oregon and the Pacific




Northwest. His stories are often set in the Oregon outdoors and make frequent references to Oregon history and culture. The essays in this book reflect this theme. Several stories about salmon fishing, logging, and working-class families are in this book. Other entries include an obituary for

Ken Kesey, observations on the Pendleton Roundup, and refereeing basketball at the Oregon School for the Deaf.

American Indian Politics and the American Political System

This is a comprehensive look at tribes and how their governments operate in the United States.



The book provides multiple examples of how tribal governments interact with state and federal government entities. Included are Supreme Court decisions that impact tribes, indigenous government responses to cultural appropriations, the use of social media by native people for organizing and activism, and tribe responses to environmental issues like climate change.

Shadow Tribe: The Making of Columbia River **Indian Identity**

The Columbia River Tribe refers to members of tribes located along the Colum-



bia River who refused to move and settle on reservations located far from their homes. Living and fishing on the Columbia River, these communities of native peoples were directly impacted by the construction of dams and resulting destruction of traditional fishing sites like Celilo Falls. The Columbia River Tribe is not a federally recognized tribe. Conflicts this community has had with federally recognized tribes are included in the book.

One of the first things a family should do is pack a "Go Bag" for every family member. A "Go Bag" should also be carried in every vehicle and you should have one with you at your place of work. Emergencies happen anywhere.

CIHA has educational material and pamphlets available in the front office and local area tsunami evacuation route maps. The maps outline our local area inundation zones, safe evacuation routes to high ground, and list emergency contact numbers.

> Discuss various disaster scenarios that could affect your family, e.g. fire, earthquake, tsunami, power outage, etc., and make a plan with your family on what to do in the event of an emergency.

Don't forget to prepare for pets and family medical conditions.
