Protect Your Family and Home from Theft



With theft crime on the rise in Coos County, it is important to take extra security measures to protect your home and property.

1. Lock your windows, doors, and gates when you will be away from home - even if you will be gone for only a short time.
2. Make your home looked lived in; hang your curtains and blinds strategically; put your lights, television, and a radio on a programmable timer.
3. Do not tell people when you are going to be away from home; do not hide a key under the doormat.
4. Hide your valuables in unusual places; most burglars go straight to the master bedroom and may not take the time to look elsewhere.
5. Keep your car locked at all times and place valuables in the trunk out of sight.
6. Install sensor lights.

I'll say this. One thing I've learned in the last month is

that despite the summer fog and wind it still gets hot at Kilkich. Lots of warm summer days, but nothing an open window can't fix.

I am very lucky to have recently traveled to Peru with my wife. Throughout the trip I had many opportunities to meet with Peruvians who are Quechua, the descendents of the Inca. I learned and experienced many positive things from them. I am a member of the Coquille Tribe and to meet with other indigenous people, especially living in a different country, opened my eyes to a lot of things. My point is that I was able to learn from them because I am able to speak a little bit of Spanish. Many people there knew some English and all spoke the Quechua language, but I found that knowing some Spanish (and I'm far from fluent) allowed me many more chances to meet and learn from the people I met there. I would encourage anyone who has learned some Spanish to practice, practice, practice, and practice some more. The Library has some Spanish language materials that could help a student who is taking Spanish or others interested in learning.

One of the many web pages out there that you could use to practice your language skills is Quia (<http://www.quia.com/web>). Quia provides free tests and lessons on many subjects for all grade levels. Many of the lessons were designed by teachers from around the world. **The site is free.** I use Quia for its extensive Spanish tutorials. It is one of many subjects Quia covers extensively. The web page boasts of having over 3 million online activities and quizzes on over 300 subjects. Again, it is free and just maybe it could be of great assistance to students of any age who want to focus on a subject.

The Library recently ordered five more copies of [The People are Dancing Again](#); the story about the restoration of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz. It is not a small book, but that only means it is richer in its information. I've mentioned this before, but it is worth mentioning again. This book is one of several in the Library that talks about the Coquille and other indigenous groups from southwest Oregon. Please come by and check something out and if you have a suggestion for a new purchase, please let me know. Thank you; enjoy the rest of your summer.

2011 National Night Out - Tuesday, August 2

On Tuesday, August 2, 2011 from 5:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. neighborhoods throughout North Bend and Coos Bay are asked to lock their doors, turn on outside lights, and spend the evening outside with neighbors and police at the Ferry Road Park in North Bend for the "28th Annual National Night Out" (NNO) crime and drug prevention event.

Ferry Road Park is located off of Sherman Avenue on Ferry Road near McCullough bridge. The **FREE event** will include a cookout, live music, a cakewalk, many youth activities, and much, much more.
