

On March 11, 2011, Japan was devastated by a 9.0 magnitude earthquake which triggered a deadly tsunami. Thousands of people lost their lives and severe, extensive structural damage was widespread in Japan. Millions in north-eastern Japan were left without water and electricity for weeks.

The one-year anniversary of Japan's earthquake is a persuasive reminder of the vital need to be prepared for a similar catastrophic event here on the south coast, an event that could happen at any time.

Don Lewis and Rachel Lyles from the State of Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI) will be at the Community Plankhouse Monday, March 12, 2012 to present information on the looming potential for a



Cascadia event, similar to the 2011 Japan earthquake. Don and Rachel will discuss the Cascadia Subduction Zone, what to expect from an earthquake, the aftermath of an earthquake, and how to prepare for an earthquake.

Our local Tsunami Outreach Oregon (TOO) Coordinators, Mikel Chavez and Lindsey Bishop, will present information about upcoming local TOO events and activities.

Please plan on attending this important event. Education, preparation, and planning reduce the consequences of a disaster and may very well save your life.



Dawes Allotment Act - 125 Years Ago

“General Allotment Act or Dawes Act (1887): An act to provide for the allotment of lands in severalty to Indians on the various reservations, and to extend the protection of the laws of the United States and the Territories over the Indians, and for other purposes.”

February 9, 2012 marks the 125-year anniversary of the signing of the Dawes or Allotment Act of 1887.

Last month’s Sea-Runner Library article talked about a recent editorial on the 75-year anniversary of the Indian Reorganization Act. As it turns out, February 2012 is the 125-year anniversary of another piece of legislation that had a dramatic effect on many Native communities in the United States: The Dawes or Allotment Act. Below is a little information on it, including links where readers can find more information.


The **Dawes Act** (also called General Allotment Act, or Dawes Severalty Act of 1887) was approved by Congress in 1887. The Act authorized the President of the United States to survey lands owned or held in trust for Tribes and divide it into parcels to be given to individual Tribal members. Indian ownership of land was seen as a means to “assimilate” Indians into American society and it was amended twice in the next 20 years to further meet that goal. One of many consequences was the reduction of the Siletz Reservation. Indeed, Tribes lost over 90

million acres of land due to Allotments. Not only that, the Act cleared the way for the U.S. government to purchase “excess” lands and make them available for non-Indians. November 2011 was declared Native American Heritage Month by President Obama via Executive Order. This Order states that Obama’s administration “recognizes the painful chapters in our shared history.” These chapters include the allotment period that began with the passing of this Act. UO Law Students offer FREE Tax Assistance Saturday, March 31st 10:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. CIT Community Center

UO law students have volunteered to provide FREE tax preparation assistance to low-moderate income (\$50,000 gross or below) Native Americans on Saturday, March 31, 2012. The law students have taken the federal Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program training, and as certified volunteers, will assist qualifying Native American families and individuals in preparing and filing their income tax returns.

The assistance will be available on Saturday, March 31, 2012 from 10:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. at the CIT Community Center. Please bring:

- Proof of Identification
- Social Security cards for all family members
- Birth dates for all family members
- Wage and earning statements
- Interest and dividend statements (Forms 1099)
- Copy of 2010 federal and state income tax returns
- Proof of bank account routing numbers and account numbers for Direct Deposit (a blank check)
- Total paid for daycare and daycare provider's tax identifying number
