Events start at 8:30a.m. with a Traditional Salmon Ceremony at Bullards Beach State Park. All Tribal and Canoe Families are welcome.


9:00a.m. Canoes begin short river journey to Bandon to commence the Restoration Celebration.

THE HISTORY OF MEMORIAL DAY



Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in our nation's service.

There are many stories as to its actual beginnings, with over two dozen cities and towns laying claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day. While Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it's difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day. It is more

likely that it had many separate beginnings; each of those towns and every planned or spontaneous gathering of people to honor the war dead in the 1860's tapped into the general human need to honor our dead, each contributed honorably to the growing movement that culminated in General Logan giving his official proclamation in 1868. It is not important who was the very first, what is important is that Memorial Day was established. Memorial Day is about reconciliation; it is about coming together to honor those who gave their all. By the late 1800s, many communities across the country had begun to celebrate Memorial Day and, after World War I, observances also began to honor those who had died in all of America's wars. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be celebrated the last Monday in May. (Veteran's Day, a day set aside to honor all veterans, living and dead, is celebrated each year on November 11.) Today, Memorial Day is celebrated at Arlington National Cemetery with a ceremony in which a small American flag is placed on each grave. Also, it is customary for the president or vice-president to give a speech honoring the contributions of the dead and lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. About 5,000 people attend the ceremony annually.

WINDOW SAFETY TIPS

As things start to warm up and windows start getting opened, please remember the following safety items.

1. Make sure your windows are in good, working condition yearly. A loose window could fall and hurt a nearby child.
2. Keep your windows closed

- and locked when children are around. When opening windows for ventilation, open windows that a child cannot reach, or in the case of a double-hung window, open the top sash only.
3. Keep objects, including furniture, a child can climb on away from windows to prevent accidents.
4. Keep children's play away from windows or patio doors. Falling through the

glass can be fatal or cause serious injury.

5. Don't rely on insect screens to prevent a fall. Insect screens are designed to provide ventilation while keeping insects out; they are not designed to, nor will they prevent a child's fall from a window.


KRA Meeting
