## 25<sup>th</sup> Annual Tribal Restoration Celebration

On June 28, 1989, the Coquille Indian Tribe regained status as a federally recognized Indian Tribe. After 34 years of "termination" and federal policy that denied the Tribe's status as Indian people, Public Law 101-42 restored the Tribe's eligibility to participate in federal Indian programs and to receive federal funding for Tribal education, health, and law enforcement programs.

*June 28, 2014 will mark the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Tribe's Restoration!*

Many special Tribal events are being planned for the 25-year commemorative anniversary, one of which is the Restoration Celebration Pow Wow and Salmon Bake scheduled for both June 28<sup>th</sup> and June 29<sup>th</sup> at The Mill Casino · Hotel featuring the Black Lodge Singers. ### Kilkich Cascadia Earthquake - Tsunami Evacuation Drill Thursday, May 22, 2014 2:00 p.m. Sharp!



If you have not packed a 72-hour emergency kit, assemble one today!

In the event of a real earthquake - tsunami, the only notification you will have is the ground shaking.

- At 2:00 p.m. sharp, as if the earthquake is beginning, DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON.
- Next, grab your emergency kit and head to high ground.
- There will be NO siren sounded for this drill, just as there will be **NO SIREN** sounded **IF THE EARTHQUAKE IS REAL.** The earth shaking will be your only warning.
- **NO ONE WILL KNOCK ON YOUR DOOR TO REMIND YOU OF THIS DRILL.**
- The evacuation drill is voluntary but strongly encouraged.

## Oregon Tribal Environmental and Cultural Events



I thought I would start this month by relating a few items of interest that appeared in the Tribe's April edition of K'wen 'inish-ha. These items include one news story involving an Oregon tribe and two events on the Oregon coast that might be of particular interest to Killich residents and the Coquille Indian Tribe community.

**Klamath Tribes vote for water agreement:** A historic agreement was reached on the management of the Upper Klamath Basin. The water from this basin and the entire Klamath River system has been the subject of intense debate for decades. During a drought a few years ago, the issue of who had water rights became very tense as water resources became scarce. A comprehensive agreement was signed this year that hopefully, will lead the way to supporting both healthy fisheries and a long-term stable agricultural economy. This agreement comes after eight months of negotiations and a federal court decision last year that confirmed the Klamath Tribes had senior water rights in this region. The Klamath Tribes (Klamath, Modoc, and Yahooskin) general council recently voted to approve the agreement. The agreement includes a water use program that will increase inflows to

Upper Klamath Lake by 30,000 acre feet every year, a program to improve local riverine habitats and help restore fisheries, and an economic development program for the Klamath Tribes. **A couple of upcoming coastal events:** On Saturday, May 10<sup>th</sup>, the Siletz Tribal Arts and Heritage Society and the Siletz Cultural Department are sponsoring the **Siletz Indian Fair**. With a theme of *"Sharing Our Culture, Educating Our Community"*, the event will provide many chances for members of the Siletz Tribes to share their knowledge with guests. Families from the Siletz Tribes will display their family's regalia, baskets, and other art forms. Siletz Tribe's various programs and departments will be on hand to talk about and demonstrate traditional practices and show how Siletz culture exists today; guests will have plenty of chances to learn and participate.

If you are wondering why the event is called a "Tribal Fair", it is because in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century the Siletz Tribe and the local community held an Indian Fair every year. The 2014 Fair is the Siletz Tribe's first attempt to bring back this event to the Newport community since 1917. The event will be held at **Newport's National Guard**

**Armory from 12 noon to 5 p.m. on Saturday, May 10<sup>th</sup>.**

A little closer to home, a gathering is scheduled in Port Orford to honor the memory of the people who lived in the traditional village of Tseriadun, which is located near where the city is today. The **21<sup>st</sup> annual Tseriadun Village Honoring and Salmon Bake will be held the weekend of May 17-18 at the Tseriadun State Recreational Site near Port Orford**. The event is described as a Salmon Bake and Potluck with many opportunities to share stories, traditions and wisdom. Daily events will include carving, weaving, beading, and storytelling. Several canoe families will be present and canoe races will definitely take place.
