School Safety



For most of the year, children spend more time at school than anywhere else other than their own home. Overall, schools are one of the safest places children can be. However, some schools have problems, such as bullying and theft, which make them less secure. These problems make students and educators feel less safe, and it makes it harder for students to learn. There are specific ways that parents can make going to school a safer and more valuable learning experience for their children.

- Talk to your children about their day. Sometimes children won't tell you right away if they are having problems at school. Look for warning signs, such as a sudden drop in grades, loss of friends, or torn clothing.
- Teach children to resolve problems without fighting. Talk to them about other ways they can work out a problem, such as talking it out, walking away, or telling a trusted


adult.



- Keep an eye on your children's Internet use. Let them know they can talk to you if anything they see online makes them uncomfortable, whether it's an explicit website or a classmate bullying them or someone else through email, chat or websites.
- Map out with your children a safe way for them to walk to school or to the bus stop. Avoid busy roads and intersections, vacant lots, construction areas, and parks.
- Teach children to follow traffic signals and rules when walking or biking. Stress that they should cross the street at crosswalks or intersections with crossing guards when they can.
- Teach children not to talk to strangers, go anywhere with them, or accept gifts from them without your permission. Tell them that if they see a suspicious stranger hanging around or in their school they

should tell an adult.

- Help children memorize their phone number and full address, including area code and zip code. Write down other important phone numbers such as your work and cell phone on a card for your children to carry with them.
- Make sure children know to stand on the sidewalk or grass while waiting for the bus.
- Teach children to make sure they can see the bus driver and the bus driver can see them before crossing in front of the bus. Tell them to never walk behind the bus.
- Be aware that often bullying takes place on the school bus. Ask children about the bus; who they sit with, who they talk to, and what the other kids do. Let them know that if they see someone being bullied, or are bullied themselves, they can talk to you, the bus driver, or another trusted adult.





Pet Health & Safety Tips



Pet health and safety is a concern throughout the year. Our animals rely on us to take care of their needs and well-being, and make sure they are kept safe from harm. CIHA has a Pet Policy in place to help insure these needs are met. For instance, did you know:

- ◆ All animals must be registered with CIHA. This registration must be updated annually. CIHA does not have a means to locate the owner of a lost animal without a photo and description of your animal on file. This means your animal may go to the local shelter if no one knows who the animal belongs to. ***Please register your animal.***
- ◆ Registration for dogs and cats include:
 - ◆ A description of the animal
 - ◆ A recent photograph (CIHA will be happy to take the photo)
 - ◆ A license tag and date of license for dogs (All dogs are required to be licensed)
 - ◆ Certification by a veterinarian that the animal has been spayed or neutered
 - ◆ Required vaccinations, including a current rabies shot (call CIHA for list)
- ◆ By keeping your animal current on vaccinations, you are not only protecting your animal, but the other people and animals who come in contact with your animal.
- ◆ Low cost spay and neuter clinics, as well as low cost vaccinations clinics, are available at different times throughout the year.
- ◆ Dogs must be on a leash at all times when outside of the residence. Some people are uncertain and scared of dogs, especially large dogs. Please be considerate of others.
- ◆ Disposal of dog and cat waste:
 - ◆ Animal waste is unsightly and unpleasant. Please be considerate of others, and dispose of your animal waste in an appropriate, sanitary manner.
 - ◆ All animal waste must be picked up immediately and disposed of properly.
 - ◆ Cat litter should be disposed of often to keep the residence free of odor.
