Kilkich Community Garden Beds Are Still

Spring has finally arrived, and despite the March rains and infrequent sunshine, the flowers are in bloom, the trees are budding, and the hummingbirds are in search of nectar. It won't be long before it is time to start planting seeds and seedlings in the garden.

The perimeter fence deters deer, elk, and other animals; slugs are usually your most obnoxious and destructive pests.

weather crops generally perform well. Past success has been seen with artichokes, beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, chives, kale, kohlrabi, leeks, lettuces, mustard greens, onions, peas, potatoes, spinach, squash, and turnips, just to name a few.

The Kilkich Community Garden has raised garden beds available again this year.

As a gardener, you will be required to maintain your garden bed. This includes planting, weeding, and harvesting as needed, which will require a weekly commitment of time and energy.

The garden beds are free to use, secured behind a padlocked gate, and on a timed watering system (you will not need to water your bed).

The garden beds have soil in them. You may amend the soil in the bed with fertilizer/compost. If you are new to gardening and are unsure what might grow in our coastal climate, cool

Maximize Your 2017 Holiday Credit

In 2016, as in previous years, the CIHA Board of Commissioners approved a December holiday credit to be awarded to each household on Tribal Lands. The credit ranged from \$25 to \$150.

If you are interested in earning the maximum holiday credit in 2017, the criteria is as follows:



1. Pay your rent/house payment on time and in full each month
2. Pass your annual household inspection
3. Return all paperwork in full and on time
4. Have no actionable neighborhood complaints
5. Have no power, water, or garbage shutoff notices
6. Have no yard notices

Safety Starts At Home - Be Vigilant, Practice Safe Habits, Stay Alert



The Kilkich community, in general, is a safe place to live. It is a quiet community with infrequent crime, and most residents are familiar with other community members and normal traffic.

There are, however, many people who are not Kilkich residents that frequent our community on a daily basis. The non-residents may be visiting family/friends, using the loop or dog trails for exercise or to walk their dog; kids and adults ride their bikes up the hill to ride the paved areas; and a variety of people come up to catch the CCAT bus.

Having unknown people in the neighborhood is normal and no cause for concern, however, it is ALWAYS wise to practice good safety habits at ALL TIMES to keep your home and family safe.

- It is a good practice to keep external doors locked, even when home

- NEVER open your door to a stranger and teach your children the same or always have an adult greet unknown visitors
- Leave a porch light on at night so you can see out the peep hole; NEVER open your door if you do not know who is knocking
- Keep the perimeter around your home clean and tidy so that it does not provide hiding places
- ALWAYS secure your home when you leave (doors and windows) and use a range of lights on timers so that your home always looks occupied
- Keep your vehicles locked AT ALL TIMES; personal property stolen from unlocked vehicles has been a problem in the past and is avoidable
- Always walk with a buddy and carry a fully charged cell phone

- Always let someone know where you are going and when you will be back
- Be aware of your surroundings at all times
- Do not approach strangers, even if they seem in distress; dial 911

The listed tips are just a few safety habits to practice. Use common sense when it comes to safety and don't become complacent.

Crime never takes a day off and is always looking for opportunity. Deter criminal activity by practicing safe habits both at home and when you are out and about.

Identity Theft And Cybercrime - What To Do If You Become A



The 2017 Identity Fraud Study, released by Javelin Strategy and

Research, found that \$16 billion was stolen from 15.4 million U.S. consumers in 2016, compared to \$15.3 billion and 13.1 million victims a year earlier.

Following the introduction of microchip equipped credit cards in 2015 in the U. S., which make the credit cards difficult to counterfeit, criminals focused on new account

fraud. New account fraud occurs when a thief opens a credit card or other financial account using a victim's name and other stolen personal information.

If you or someone you know is a victim of identity theft, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has an easy to follow, extremely useful guide on what to do.

The guide is called, "Taking Charge, What To Do If Your Identity Is Stolen".

Oregon Unclaimed Property Search

Oregon is holding millions of dollars in unclaimed assets – savings bonds, stock dividends, tax refunds, and uncashed checks.

State law requires businesses and organizations to send all unclaimed funds to the Department of State Lands if the owner cannot be contacted after a certain amount of time, usually within three years.

Each year, about \$50 million is remitted to DSL, and about half of that amount is returned to rightful owners (nearly 20,000 people or entities).

All unclaimed funds are held in Oregon’s Common School Fund until claimed.

Interest earnings from the fund are sent to Oregon schools twice a year.

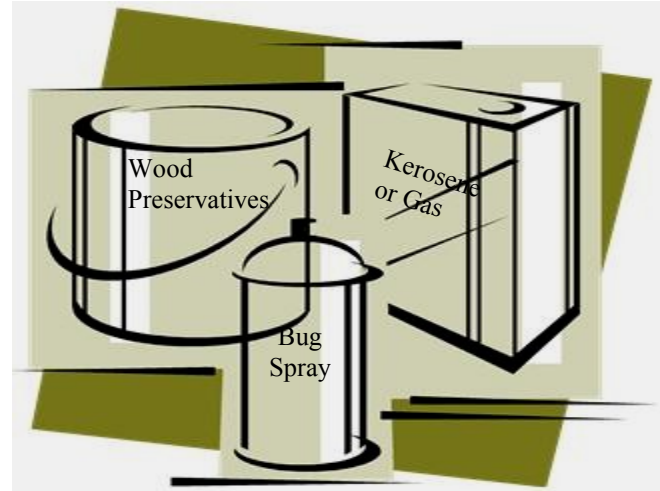

Make sure containers are properly sealed so they won't leak or spill. If a container is leaking, secure it in a secondary leak-proof container.

Transport in a sturdy box or tub in your trunk or truck bed.

Please do not put items in plastic bags.
