
September KRA Meeting

September is National Preparedness Month



September is National Preparedness Month with the theme "Disasters Happen. Prepare Now. Learn How."

As the theme states, while 'disasters happen', you have the opportunity to 'prepare now', practice and build your plan, and update your plan on an annual basis.



One of the first things a family should do is pack a "Go Bag" for every family member. In addition to having a 'Go Bag' at home for every family member, a 'Go Bag' should be carried in every vehicle as well as at your place of work.

Emergencies happen anywhere.

The internet has a tremendous amount of excellent information on disaster preparedness. CIHA has educational material and pamphlets available in the front office and local area tsunami evacuation route maps. The maps outline our local area inundation zones, safe evacuation routes to high ground, and list emergency contact numbers.

Discuss various disaster scenarios that could affect your family, e.g. fire, earthquake, tsunami, power outage, etc., and make a plan with your family on what to do in the event of an emergency.

Don't forget to prepare for pets and family medical conditions.

Keep Your Family and Community Safe



The Kilkich community is a safe place to live, but that does not imply or guarantee that crime doesn't exist or happen here. Stay alert; be safe.

1. Notice suspicious activity?? Report it to the Tribal Police immediately at 541-888-0189 or police dispatch at 541-269-8911. It is better to report suspected suspicious activity, than to not report it and later be a victim or a witness to a crime/problem.



- 2. Keep doors and windows to your home, garage, and car locked at all times. Criminals are opportunists. https://getsafe.com/whatburglars-steal-where-they-look/
- 3. Do not let children play outside unsupervised. THIS IS REALLY IMPORTANT! Anyone, at any STRANGER time, has the opportunity to walk, bike, or drive through the Kilkich community.
- 4. Do not open your door/home to anyone DAuces you do not know. Only open your door to people you know. If someone knocks and says they need help, call 911 for them.
- 5. Use caution when walking at night. Always walk with a companion and wear visible/ reflective clothing. Carry a cell phone, a flashlight, and stay in populated areas. STAY
- 6. Do not advertise on social media when you are or will be away from your home. Criminals monitor social media to find easy targets. Let CIHA and Tribal Police know if you will be gone for an extended period of time.
- 7. ALL drug activity is illegal on Tribal Lands. Help keep drugs out of your neighborhood! Report known or suspected activity.

CIT Community Health Center Launches NextGen® Care Technology to Expand Patient Communications NextGen® is a patient information system designed to streamline the Clinic team's workflow and effectively manage patient healthcare through improved communications and recordkeeping. By utilizing NextGen® Care, the Clinic is able to:

- Easily identify gaps in patient care
- Send out automatic health campaigns/reminders to patients
- Collaborate care when patients require multiple providers and tasks

With NextGen® Care, the clinic staff will be able reach specific patient populations. For example, a high blood pressure campaign might include a check-up notice to those patients with chronic disease or risk factors. It can also be used to communicate annual reminders, such as the need for a flu shot. Only patients who receive care at the CIT Community Health Center will receive messages. You will see your reminders either by logging into the patient portal online, by email, text, letter, or a phone call from the clinic. If a patient prefers not to receive these messages, there will be an option to opt out. All patients are encouraged to sign up with the NextGen® patient portal to access their medical information and to receive notifications. NextGen® Care launches in August 2018.
