## Kilkich Community Garden Beds Available

The Kilkich Community Garden has raised garden beds available this year.

The garden beds are free to use, secured behind a padlocked gate, and on an automatic watering system (you will not need to water your garden bed).

The perimeter fence deters deer, elk, and other animals; slugs are usually your most obnoxious and destructive pests.



If you are new to gardening or are unsure what might grow in our coastal climate, cool weather crops will generally perform well.

Gardeners have had good success with artichokes, beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, chives, herbs, kale, kohlrabi, leeks, lettuces, mustard greens, onions, peas, potatoes, spinach, squash, swiss chard, and turnips just to name a few.

As a gardener, you will be required to prepare and maintain your garden bed which requires a weekly commitment of time and energy. You will need to:

- prepare your bed
- plant your bed
- weed your bed
- and harvest your bed



The garden beds have soil in them. You may want to amend the soil in the bed with fertilizer/compost. Gardeners are responsible for providing their own fertilizer, compost, garden plants, garden seeds, pest control, and garden tools.

## CIHA's Common Scheme Restriction Policy

Please Do Not Drive Or Park On Grass

Just a reminder that per CIHA's Common Scheme Restriction Policy, "All parking, other than in the driveway or garage, must be on the side of the street where the streetlights are and must NOT exceed 24 hours." In addition, "No tent structure, camper, recreational vehicle, motorcycle, trail bike, snowmobile, boat, trailer, motor coach, or mobile home, or any structure of any

kind shall be parked, placed, erected, or used upon the property."

Please comply with the CSR policy immediately. If you receive a non-compliance letter, it will count against your December holiday credit.

## Grab The Binoculars - It's Whale Watching Season

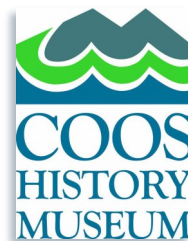


In late March 2019, up to 20,000 migrating gray whales will start their northbound voyage back to Alaska. Peak season is March, but the whales can be seen well into the summer months.

It's estimated that 18,000-plus gray whales now live in the eastern north Pacific area. About 200 of these whales drop off the migration route and feed along the Oregon coast throughout the summer months. Don't miss their migration!
