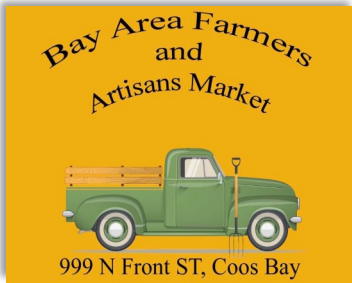

Earthquakes, Tsunamis, Wildfires ... Are You Prepared?

There were numerous earthquakes off the Oregon coast a few weeks ago. The swarm of earthquakes occurred along the Blanco Fracture Zone, which is Oregon’s most seismically active zone. According to geologists, the Cascadia Subduction Zone, which is the zone to worry about, has not shown any increased seismicity lately. But it is good to remember that we live in earthquake country and have to be prepared. Even a power outage is less stressful if you are prepared. So PLEASE, prepare TODAY if you have not already done so. Your preparation will ease the burden on limited resources in the event of a catastrophic event and will provide your family with peace of mind. You won’t have to say, “I wish I would have”

Every family member should have a ‘Go Bag’. In addition, a ‘Go Bag’ should be carried in every vehicle as well as at your place of work. **Disasters can happen anywhere at anytime.**

The internet is a valuable source of excellent information on what to pack in a ‘Go Bag’ and on disaster preparedness in general. Discuss various disaster scenarios with your family, make a plan with your family on what to do in the event of an emergency, and decide upon a place to meet should you get separated.

This is SO important! Equally important is to **PRACTICE YOUR EMERGENCY PLAN with your family!**
