The Community Heat Pump Deployment Program grants funds to eligible entities to provide financial assistance for the purchase and installation of heat pumps and related upgrades to individuals who reside within the region or who are members of the tribe that an entity serves. The program is open to Oregon Tribes, local governments, local housing authorities, nonprofit organizations, coordinated care organizations, community action agencies, manufactured dwelling park nonprofits, and electric utilities. The grants may be allocated to one eligible entity for each region and one eligible entity for each federally recognized Indian Tribe in Oregon.

Qualifications

Describe your experience in administering either state grant programs or programs similar to the Community Heat Pump Deployment Program. 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For the last 30 years, the Coquille Indian Housing Authority ("CIHA" or "Authority") has been responsible for establishing and operating multiple grant-funded affordable housing programs to support the well-being of the Coquille Tribal membership. During the 2023 federal fiscal year ("FFY"), CIHA administered \$2.9 million in federal funds. CIHA's primary ongoing source of funding is the HUD Indian Housing Block Grant ("IHBG"), which supports programs within the Tribe's five-county service area, which includes Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, and Lane Counties in Oregon. The HUD IHBG comprised \$1.8 million of CIHA's FFY 2023 budget. CIHA also operates programs available to the membership nationwide funded by other federal and Tribal sources. Most recently, CIHA has been awarded two grants by the State of Oregon Housing and Community Services to prevent homelessness and support shelter services for the homeless, and to promote Tribal homeownership opportunities through a first-time homebuyer assistance program. Both State grant programs are currently in development and will begin operation in 2024.

In FFY 2021, CIHA entered into a partnership agreement with the Energize the South Coast program, sponsored by Spark Northwest and Rogue Climate, to promote the purchase and installation of ductless heat pumps in the homes of low- and moderate-income Tribal families located on the South Coast of Oregon. CIHA received \$18,000 from the program to be used for the benefit of the Coquille Tribe and the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua, and Siuslaw Indians. With those funds, CIHA designed, marketed, and operated an incentive program that successfully funded installations in the homes of two low-income Tribal elders and the Tribal elders' activities center.

Further, CIHA has a strong commitment to the adoption of clean energy and reduction of carbon emissions as demonstrated by its partnership with Common Energy in support of the State of Oregon Community Solar Program and the resource conservation measures featured in the residences and buildings it owns and operates. In the past year, CIHA has installed what is believed to be the largest solar photovoltaic power generation system with battery storage on the South Coast of Oregon. CIHA has also been named one of the 100 Best Green Workplaces in Oregon by Oregon Business magazine.

Describe your experience developing community programs for a geographic region or with members of a Tribe.

CIHA offers a variety of programs to Coquille Tribal members, other American Indians, and Alaska Natives, targeting varying income levels and selection preferences, locally, regionally, and nationwide. Its core programs include 64 low rent and homebuyer units on Coquille Tribal Lands in Coos County, 50 units of tenant based rental assistance available within the Tribe's 5-county service area, and 14 units of tenant based rental assistance available nationwide. In addition, it offers emergency rental housing,

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emergency rental assistance, housing stabilization and homelessness prevention, emergency homeowner assistance, first time homebuyer assistance, and other housing-related services with diverse service delivery areas. CIHA also maintains partnerships with multiple service providers and organizations that support its mission and goals.

The CIHA organization has an exceptional performance history supported by its capable, long-term staffing, robust internal controls and monitoring protocols, annual financial audits, and outside agency reviews.

The Authority has a staff of nine employees, all of whom have worked for CIHA for many years and whose experience in affordable housing and community development totals in excess of 165 years cumulatively. The Oregon Department of Energy Community Heat Pump Deployment Program management team builds on the relevant and recent expertise of CIHA staff and is supported by the Tribe's climate resilience taskforce, communications team, and other Tribal programs and resources in its work.

Key members of the project management team include:

Anne Cook, Executive Director: Ms. Cook has worked for the Authority for 23 years, the last 20 as Executive Director. In the past five years, she has managed over \$12 million in grant, Tribal, and other agency funds. Under her leadership, the Authority has completed multiple construction and rehabilitation projects, expanded existing programs and services, designed and implemented new programs, and maintained exceptional performance standards in all areas of operation. Her role with this program will include policy and program development, communications, direction, and oversight.

Debbie Dennis, Administrative Services Coordinator: Ms. Dennis recently celebrated 17 years with the Authority. Her work involves a variety of functions, including scheduling and tracking, procurement, managing facilities, equipment, and supplies, IT support, database maintenance, records management, operating special programs, and compliance monitoring. Her support of this program will include developing forms, receiving and screening applications, facilitating participant access to complementary incentives and resources, interacting with contractors to arrange payment, providing follow up support to participants, and reporting.

Marcy Chytka, Financial Controller: Ms. Chytka has overseen all aspects of the Authority's financial activities for 16 years and maintains its records of account, assures compliance

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with financial management policies, grant accounting requirements, generally accepted accounting principles, and other applicable laws and regulations. On this project, she will ensure successful performance of all accounting functions, maintain complete and accurate records, and compile financial reports.

CIHA is the Tribally Designated Housing Entity (TDHE) for the Coquille Indian Tribe. It provides housing assistance to low- to moderate-income members of the Coquille Indian Tribe, other American Indians, and Alaska Natives. The Tribe has nearly 1,200 members nationwide, the majority of whom reside in Oregon. Approximately 600 Coquille Tribal members reside within the Tribe's 5-county service area. An estimated 35% of the total Tribal membership currently participates in CIHA housing assistance programs.

CIHA is the Tribally Designated Housing Entity (TDHE) of the Coquille Indian Tribe and offers housing assistance to low- to moderate-income Coquille Tribal members, other American Indians, and Alaska Natives. Most CIHA program participants reside in the Tribe's five-county service area, which includes Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, and Lane Counties in Oregon.

American Indians and Alaska Natives are acknowledged to be among the most socioeconomically disadvantaged groups in the United States by multiple indices. CIHA is grateful for the State of Oregon's commitment to ensuring equitable access to State programs, services, grants, and other resources by Tribes and other BIPOC communities.

Describe your connections to regional or tribal communities.

CIHA is the Tribally Designated Housing Entity (TDHE) of the Coquille Indian Tribe, established by Tribal ordinance to serve its membership. It maintains a close connection with neighboring Tribes through frequent communications and cooperative efforts. CIHA engages regularly with all of the nine federally recognized Tribes located in Oregon

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through the Oregon Housing and Community Services Tribal Housing Workgroup. The Authority's Director is a current appointee to the Executive Committee of the Northwest Indian Housing Association representing Tribes in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. CIHA is also a member of the National American Indian Housing Council.

Program participation will be limited to Coquille Tribal members who own and occupy a residence in Oregon where the heat pump will be installed.

Assistance will be prioritized for applicants with the greatest number of preference points. It is estimated that 10-15 single-family dwellings will be assisted.

Program design, planning, and start up will follow the existing model established by CIHA's Energize the South Coast Program, with the addition of ducted heat pump eligibility. No specific challenges are anticipated.

Policy and program development will begin immediately following notification of award. Communications and marketing will begin upon execution of a grant award agreement. The program will launch at least 30 days from the first announcement of its availability. Application screening will begin on the date advertised. Initially, grants will be awarded

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to the first 10 applicants to submit complete applications. A waiting list will be maintained for additional applicants. The applicant at the top of the waiting list, based on preference points and date of application, will be assisted based on funding availability.
