If you've lived at Kilkich for more than 10 years, chances are you'll remember Tribal Police Officer Brian Dubray.

Brian began his career in law enforcement in 2002 as a North Bend Police Department 911 dispatcher and as a reserve officer.

In 2006, Brian came to work for the Coquille Indian Tribe and entered the Police Academy. While here, he was the Major Crimes Team Coordinator and on the Coos County Child Safety Seat Coalition amongst others. As many of you with kids know, Brian started the Bicycle Rodeo in 2007. The Rodeo has always been a great benefit and confidence booster for the kids. Brian designed the bicycle courses and enjoyed bringing families together while incorporating the safety aspect of cycling and making it fun.

Brian said that working at Kilkich gave him the opportunity to have positive interactions with the residents, especially the kids, and build relationships to make it easier to interact with the kids as they grew up. He especially enjoyed having lunch with the kids as he felt it important to make them feel comfortable around law enforcement.

In 2014, Brian left the Coquille Tribal Police department and moved to Florence with his wife Ramona. He then went to work for the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians (CTCLUSI) as a Sergeant where he learned to be in a supervisory position. Two years later he was promoted to Lieutenant. In July of 2021, Brian was sworn in as Police Chief for CTCLUSI. Brian has continued to climb one more step and in April of this year, became COO as well as Chief of Police. Brian likes to provide support for the tribe and its members and guidance to other departments. When not working, Brian enjoys being outside, traveling, and listening to music.



PREPARE

in a year

Each month, the Sea~Ha Runner will feature ideas and suggestions on how to prepare for an emergency situation. ONE HOUR of disaster preparedness activity EACH MONTH will help you be 2 WEEKS READY for disasters.

COMMUNICATION PLAN:

If you are separated from your loved ones when a disaster strikes, your first thoughts will be about your family, their location, and their condition. The stress of the event may make it difficult to remember even routine information, like phone numbers. We recommend that every household member have an out-of-area contact card in a wallet, purse, or backpack at all times.

Ask an out-of-area friend or relative to be your contact person. This person should live at least 100 miles away from you. They can send messages to your family in the affected area and then reply back to you. An out-of-area contact is the key piece of a great communications plan to let family know about each other being safe – especially if the internet and cell phone signals are sparse following a major event, such as a big earthquake.



It may be difficult to think during the stress of a disaster. Because normal routines have been disrupted, write down numbers and information for out-of-area contacts ahead of time. Keep this information with your ‘Go Bag’.

Make sure to let your family know that these websites are available.

The American Red Cross has a website that lets you search for loved ones and register yourself as “safe and well.”
