

The **SPARC Network** (Service Providers and Regional Connections) is an initiative design to create a seamless continuum of care for individuals and families experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity in Coos and Curry Counties. By uniting public, private, and nonprofit organizations, SPARC aims to address the root causes of homelessness, connect shelter beds directly to housing opportunities, and foster long-term stability through comprehensive support systems.

The SPARC Network's Foundational Strength

The SPARC Network is anchored by its founding partners, a coalition of organizations that collectively bring expertise, resources, and innovative approaches to the housing continuum. These partners include:

- AllCare Health: Providing critical funding for services and housing projects, including the acquisition of the Ellensburg site, and supporting regional initiatives like Brookings CORE's Peer House Navigation Center.
- Advanced Health: Supporting health and housing integration through funding and leadership in Community Health Improvement Plans.
- **Brookings CORE Response**: Managing shelter and transitional housing programs, including Courage Lane Cottages, and linking housing efforts to permanent supportive housing at the Ellensburg site.
- **St. Timothy's Episcopal Church**: A powerful community resource offering mail services, housing advocacy, and legal support while operating programs that directly assist homeless individuals.
- **SOCRH (Southern Oregon Coast Regional Housing)**: Leading affordable housing development and stewarding community land trust models to create sustainable housing pathways.

- 4. Collaborative Resource Allocation: SPARC's founding partners combine their strengths to streamline resource distribution, such as leveraging grants from CCD and contributions from healthcare providers to fund new housing developments and improve existing infrastructure.
- 5. **Regional Scalability**: SPARC's hub-and-spoke model creates a blueprint for replicable solutions in rural communities. From Courage Lane Cottages to North Bend Family Housing, SPARC demonstrates how localized efforts can collectively transform a region.

The **Service Providers and Regional Connections (SPARC) Network** is a transformative initiative tailored to address the unique housing and homelessness challenges in Coos and Curry Counties. These rural areas, with dispersed populations, aging infrastructure, and limited resources, face significant barriers to meeting the needs of their most vulnerable residents. SPARC provides a comprehensive framework that integrates shelter, transitional housing, workforce housing, and permanent affordable housing with wrap-around supportive services, creating a Continuum of Care that ensures stability and independence for individuals and families.



SPARC's strength lies in its ability to align state, federal, and local resources into a cohesive system. By leveraging funding from Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS), Coordinated Care Organizations (CCOs), federal housing programs, and local investments, SPARC creates sustainable solutions to homelessness and housing instability. This alignment fosters collaboration among service providers, governments, and community stakeholders, amplifying the impact of individual projects.

Key projects under the SPARC umbrella, such as **North Bend Family Housing**, the **Gold Beach RV Park**, and the proposed **South County Tiny House Village**, illustrate the power of SPARC's integrated approach. The **North Bend Family Housing Project**, with its 176 affordable housing units, includes Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) and Project-Based Vouchers (PBVs), delivering comprehensive support for families and seniors. Meanwhile, workforce housing initiatives like the **Hunter Creek Workforce Housing Project** in Gold Beach provide much-needed stability for essential workers, addressing both housing shortages and economic challenges.

Through these developments and more, SPARC is building the infrastructure and partnerships necessary to ensure no one is left behind. The following sections detail how SPARC's principles and practices align funding streams, integrate services, and create a replicable model that transforms the housing landscape in rural communities.


SPARC Mission:

SPARC Framework: Building a System of Shelter and Housing Integration

Key Principles

- 1. Integration of Shelter and Housing Systems
 - **Goal:** Embed shelter systems within the broader housing continuum, ensuring every shelter bed serves as an entry point to housing.
 - Approach:
 - Align shelters with housing developments to create seamless transitions for residents. For example, Belloni Ranch serves as a hub, linking emergency shelter

beds to both transitional and permanent housing options, supported by case management services.

 Utilize Coordinated Entry and HMIS systems to ensure the most vulnerable populations receive priority placements. This system also reduces duplication and inefficiencies, enabling more effective resource allocation.

2. Pathway-Centered Design

- **Goal:** Create structured pathways for individuals and families to transition from shelters to permanent housing.
- Approach:
 - Develop transitional units, including tiny homes like those at Hope Village, which provide privacy and stability while residents prepare for permanent housing.
 - Embed services such as employment readiness programs, mental health care, and financial literacy training at every stage of the housing continuum to address underlying barriers to stability.

3. Sustainable Housing Creation

- **Goal:** Expand the housing stock to ensure viable options for individuals leaving homelessness.
- Approach:
 - Utilize Community Land Trusts (CLTs) to maintain long-term affordability, as seen in the Gold Beach Workforce Housing development. CLTs preserve affordability by separating the ownership of land and buildings, allowing housing costs to remain stable for future generations.
 - Leverage braided funding models, combining state programs like OHCS's LIFT and PSH funding, federal LIHTC, and local contributions from stakeholders like Coos Health and Wellness.

4. Service Integration and Accessibility

- **Goal:** Embed comprehensive services within shelters and housing sites to address root causes of homelessness.
- Approach:
 - Partner with health organizations like ADAPT and Coos Health and Wellness to provide on-site mental health, substance use treatment, and family support services.
 - Deploy mobile outreach units, as demonstrated in Curry County, to deliver critical services like healthcare and case management directly to rural and underserved areas.

5. Community Engagement and Support

- **Goal:** Build community buy-in by highlighting the social and economic benefits of ending homelessness.
- Approach:
 - Share success stories and metrics showing the reduction of homelessness, increased workforce stability, and improved public health outcomes.
 - Engage local stakeholders, including businesses and faith-based organizations, as active partners in the system to build a broad coalition of support.

Framework in Action: SPARC Core Components

1. Emergency Shelter Hubs

- Emergency shelters serve as the first point of stabilization for individuals and families.
- **Example:** Belloni Ranch provides a centralized navigation hub with immediate access to transitional housing, supportive services, and wraparound case management. This model ensures no one stays in emergency shelter longer than necessary, transitioning clients into longer-term solutions.

2. Transitional Housing Pathways

- Transitional housing bridges the gap between emergency shelter and permanent housing.
- **Example:** Hope Village offers tiny homes with shared facilities to provide stability for residents as they work toward securing permanent housing. This approach allows residents to rebuild their independence while still receiving support.

3. Permanent Housing

Solutions

- Affordable housing developments incorporate on-site support services to ensure long-term stability.
- Example: North Bend Family Housing includes 105 affordable units in Phase I, with 20 PSH units and at least 30 PBVs. These units are supported by mental health services, employment readiness programs, and Medicaid-funded healthcare.



4. Mobile and Decentralized Services

- Mobile outreach units extend critical services to rural areas, reducing transportation barriers and expanding access to care.
- **Example:** Curry County's mobile units bring mental health care, food distribution, and housing navigation services to remote communities, ensuring no one is left behind.

5. Sustainable Financing

- SPARC employs innovative funding models to ensure long-term project viability.
- **Example:** The Hunter Creek Workforce Housing Project utilizes CLTs to maintain affordability while blending state and federal grants with private contributions.

Steps to Build the System

1. Map Existing Resources:

Conduct an inventory of all shelter beds, transitional units, and permanent housing to identify gaps and opportunities.

- 2. Develop Coordinated Entry Points: Establish centralized systems to connect individuals to housing and services based on their needs and vulnerability.
- 3. Expand Housing Stock: Use sustainable models like modular housing and CLTs to quickly and affordably increase housing availability.
- Scale Support Services: Embed services such as mental health care, job training, and financial counseling at every stage of the housing continuum.
- Monitor and Adjust: Use data-driven approaches to evaluate outcomes, refine systems, and ensure continuous improvement.

SPARC Partner Commitments

SPARC's success is driven by its partners' shared commitments:

- 1. **Resource Sharing and Coordination:** Align resources, data, and expertise across the network to streamline service delivery.
- 2. **Integrated Service Delivery:** Embed holistic programs within housing developments to promote stability and self-sufficiency.
- 3. Equity and Accessibility: Prioritize historically underserved populations, ensuring all services are inclusive and accessible.
- 4. **Innovation and Adaptability:** Continuously refine programs to address emerging challenges and incorporate new best practices.

Aligning State, Federal, and Local Resources

The SPARC Network prioritizes the strategic alignment of funding and resources across multiple levels of government and community stakeholders. This approach ensures long-term sustainability and maximizes the impact of individual projects:

- 1. State Resources
 - Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS): Leveraging programs like LIFT, Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH), and the Emergency Housing Account for shelter and housing developments.
 - **Community Land Trust (CLT) Support:** Partnering with OHCS to preserve long-term affordability and prevent displacement.
- 2. Federal Resources
 - **Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC):** Reducing development costs for affordable and workforce housing, as seen in the North Bend Family Housing project.
 - **USDA Rural Development:** Funding infrastructure improvements and housing initiatives in rural areas like Gold Beach.

- **Medicaid Reimbursements:** Supporting on-site health services such as mental health care and substance use treatment.
- 3. Local and Regional Resources
 - CCOs: Advanced Health and AllCare contribute funding to address housing as a social determinant of health, aligning with Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) goals.

continues to shape the future of housing for the region through SPARC's collaborative initiatives.

site in Curry County, addressing critical gaps in housing supply.

- Ellensburg Site in Curry County: This project will deliver 26 affordable units tailored for rural residents, including middle-income earners and those requiring Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH).
- **Economic Contributions**: Through the HCV Program, NBC/CCHA ensures landlords receive consistent income, fostering economic growth while housing vulnerable families.

A Solution for Rural Communities: The SPARC Model

The **Service Providers and Regional Connections (SPARC) Model** offers a transformative framework to address the unique challenges faced by rural communities in combating homelessness and housing instability. Rural areas, including Coos and Curry Counties, often contend with geographic isolation,

limited infrastructure, scarce resources, and dispersed populations. Traditional urbanfocused approaches, which rely heavily on centralized systems and high-density service delivery, fail to address these realities. SPARC adapts by leveraging a **hub-andspoke model** that decentralizes services while maintaining robust regional coordination, creating an innovative, scalable framework tailored to rural needs.

The SPARC Framework: Core Principles

The SPARC Model operates on the following core principles to build a comprehensive Continuum of Care:

- 1. Integrated Systems of Care
 - SPARC connects shelter beds to housing production,



creating a direct pipeline that ensures individuals and families can transition seamlessly from emergency shelter to permanent housing. By embedding housing development into the shelter system, SPARC guarantees that each shelter bed becomes a gateway to stability, rather than a dead end.

- This integration addresses the most pressing issue in homelessness: the lack of sufficient housing options to transition people out of shelter. Without connecting these systems, rural communities will continue to struggle with recurring homelessness and overburdened emergency resources.
- 2. Hub-and-Spoke Model
 - Hubs act as centralized points of coordination, such as the North Bend Family Housing Project and Belloni Ranch SPARC Community. These hubs provide emergency shelter, transitional housing, and supportive housing, supported by on-site services tailored to community needs.
 - **Spokes** extend services into rural and underserved areas through mobile outreach units, remote service centers, and partnerships with local organizations. This ensures

equitable access to critical resources, even for residents in the most isolated communities.

3. Housing as the Solution

- SPARC prioritizes housing production as the ultimate solution to homelessness.
 Shelter beds are critical stabilization tools, but their effectiveness hinges on the availability of housing to transition individuals and families into long-term stability.
- Developments like the North Bend Family Housing Project, Ellensburg Project, and Courage Lane Cottages demonstrate the direct connection between shelter and housing. These projects create permanent, affordable options while reducing bottlenecks in the shelter system.

4. Community Land Trusts (CLTs)

• SPARC ensures long-term affordability through CLTs, which separate land ownership from housing ownership. This model keeps housing accessible for future generations while addressing the systemic causes of housing instability.

5. Braided Funding Models

 By aligning state, federal, and local resources, SPARC maximizes the impact of every dollar invested. The model blends public and private funding streams, such as OHCS grants, Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC), Medicaid reimbursements, and philanthropic contributions, ensuring long-term financial sustainability.

6. Data-Driven Decision Making

 The SPARC Model emphasizes the use of data to connect shelter and housing systems effectively. Tools like Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS) prioritize individuals for housing placements into PSH units and monitor outcomes, ensuring resources are deployed where they are needed most.

Connecting Shelter Beds to Housing Production

At its core, SPARC is a framework that bridges the gap between shelters and permanent housing, addressing the root causes of homelessness and housing instability. This connection is critical because:

- Shelter Beds as an Entry Point: Shelters provide immediate stabilization, but without adequate housing options, they can become overburdened holding systems. By directly linking shelters to housing developments, SPARC transforms shelters into functional entry points for long-term solutions.
- Housing Production as the Key: The SPARC Model actively incorporates housing production into the Continuum of Care, ensuring that new units are being developed to meet demand, with linkages being created into the shelter system. Projects like the North Bend Family Housing Project, with 176 affordable units, and Ellensburg Project, are critical components of this system.

• A Coordinated Pipeline: By connecting shelter systems to housing developments, SPARC creates a coordinated pipeline that reduces reliance on emergency resources and allows us to ensure that homelessness is rare, brief, and non-recurring.

Key Components of the SPARC Framework

- 1. Continuum of Care (condensed)
 - **Shelter Hubs**: Serve as the first point of stabilization, ensuring no individual or family remains unsheltered.
 - **Transitional Housing**: Bridges the gap between emergency shelter and permanent housing, providing stability while residents prepare for long-term solutions.
 - **Permanent Housing**: Includes affordable units, workforce housing, and Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) with wrap-around services to ensure long-term success.

2. Mobile and Decentralized Services

 Mobile outreach units extend healthcare, food distribution, case management, and other critical services to remote and under-served areas. This decentralization reduces transportation barriers and increases accessibility.

3. Sustainable Housing Solutions

 CLTs, PHA's, CSO's, Non-Profits, developers and innovative construction techniques allow rural communities to rapidly expand housing stock while maintaining affordability and environmental sustainability.

4. Workforce Housing Integration

 Workforce housing developments, such as the Hunter Creek Workforce Housing Project, address the acute need for housing among essential workers, stabilizing local economies and strengthening rural communities.

The SPARC Framework transforms rural systems of care by:

- **Reducing Service Gaps**: Connecting shelter beds to housing production eliminates bottlenecks and ensures a seamless progression along the Continuum of Care.

- **Fostering Sustainability**: Housing production tied to CLTs and braided funding models creates lasting solutions that reduce dependency on emergency systems.



Goals:

- 1. Provide 176 affordable housing units, including 20 PSH and 30 PBV units, to address diverse community needs.
- 2. Integrate culturally informed and health-focused supportive services to promote stability and independence.
- 3. Utilize sustainable construction practices and include community amenities to enhance residents' quality of life.
- 4. Strengthen workforce housing options to support local economic growth and reduce turnover.
- 5. Collaborate with local school districts to improve educational outcomes through housing stability.
- 6. Demonstrate SPARC's potential to align housing solutions with integrated services, creating a sustainable model for replication.

Overview

Located in North Bend, this transformative development will deliver **176 affordable housing units** designed to meet the needs of families, individuals, and seniors in Coos County. Key features include:

- **20 Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) units**, prioritizing individuals and families with complex needs, including those experiencing chronic homelessness.
- **30 Project-Based Voucher (PBV) units**, ensuring long-term affordability for low-income households.
- A mix of housing options that support a diverse and inclusive community while addressing critical housing gaps.

This project integrates housing with supportive services, aligning with the SPARC model's goal of creating a **Continuum of Care** that provides

Core Features

1. Integrated Supportive Services

- On-Site Service Coordination: Residents will have access to dedicated service coordinators who will connect them with essential resources, including employment readiness programs, childcare support, and housing stabilization services, ensuring a pathway to long-term independence and stability.
- Health and Wellness Programs: In collaboration with Coos Health and Wellness and the South Coast Health Equity Coalition, residents will benefit from tailored wellness initiatives, including mental health support, preventative healthcare, and substance use resources, addressing key social determinants of health.

- **Energy Efficiency:** Eco-friendly construction features include solar-ready infrastructure, efficient insulation, and sustainable materials, reducing environmental impact and utility costs for residents.

- Improved Housing Stability: Supportive services such as case management, mental health care, employment readiness, and financial literacy will enhance residents' capacity to maintain stable housing and progress toward greater independence.

Target Housing Sites

1. Woodland Apartments

Located in the Empire District, Woodland Apartments will provide affordable rental units, including Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) and Project-Based Voucher (PBV) units. These units will be equipped with onsite supportive services delivered through Coos Health and Wellness, including mental health support, wellness programs, and healthcare referrals. The Empire District Revitalization Project also reduces the historical overconcentration of services, dispersing support and improving neighborhood conditions.

2. North Bend Family Housing

North Bend Family Housing will provide stable, family-focused affordable housing and workforce housing for residents. On-site services will include financial literacy, employment counseling, and family support services to foster long-term stability and self-sufficiency.

3. Gold Beach RV Park

This transitional shelter village will provide immediate shelter with integrated health and wellness services for vulnerable populations, including veterans. Managed by Brookings CORE, this site will connect residents with permanent housing opportunities through a direct referral pathway to Ellensdale, the new affordable housing complex.

4. Hope Village (TSA Campus)

As a tiny house transitional community located on The Salvation Army's Coos Bay campus, Hope Village

will offer support for individuals preparing to transition from shelter to stable housing. Residents will access employment resources, health screenings, and case management services.

5. Ellensburg Site

This new 26-unit affordable housing complex will serve as a permanent, stable housing option for individuals ready to move beyond transitional housing, including residents from Gold Beach RV Park. Coos-Curry Housing Authority, in partnership with Adapt, will provide on-site PSH services and wellness programs.

Funding and Sustainability Strategy

Located on 17.03 acres in Coos County, Belloni Ranch offers a unique opportunity to create a long-term community asset that not only addresses immediate shelter needs but also fosters pathways to stability and self-sufficiency. As a **home base for SPARC outreach and Navigation Center services**, the site will be a regional hub for delivering critical resources to Coos and Curry counties, leveraging strategic partnerships to ensure a continuum of care from emergency shelter to permanent housing.

The SPARC Community is rooted in a vision of collaboration, innovation, and inclusivity. It aligns local, state, and federal resources to create a comprehensive solution to homelessness while setting a standard for rural community development. This initiative will serve as a model for how CLTs can integrate land stewardship with housing and service delivery to build resilient, supportive communities that grow with the needs of their residents.

- Integrated Navigation Center: As a regional hub, Belloni Ranch will provide navigation services that connect residents to housing, employment, and healthcare, serving as a critical entry point for the SPARC Network.
- Scalable Development Phases: The site will be developed in phases to create 100 shelter beds alongside transitional housing, tiny homes, and permanent housing options, ensuring flexibility to adapt to future needs.
- **Community Land Trust Stewardship:** By anchoring the site within the SOCRH CLT model, Belloni Ranch will remain a permanent community asset that prioritizes affordability and accessibility.

Site Stand Up and Development Plan

Phase 1: Immediate Activation and Expanded Shelter Capacity

The SPARC Community at Belloni Ranch begins with a strong focus on addressing urgent shelter needs while laying the groundwork for long-term community development. **Phase 1** leverages existing infrastructure and innovative housing solutions to create a secure and adaptable environment for individuals and families experiencing homelessness.

- **10,000 sq ft Facility Activation**: Within three months of project initiation, a commercial-grade kitchen and other essential infrastructure will become operational. This facility will provide up to **20 family shelter beds**, meeting critical needs for safe, temporary housing.
- **Pallet Shelters Installation**: To expand emergency shelter capacity, 20 **Pallet Shelters** will be deployed on-site. These low-barrier, flexible housing units offer immediate relief to individuals experiencing homelessness, providing a stable environment while they transition to more permanent solutions.
- **Coalbank Village Relocation**: Due to FEMA floodplain requirements, the Coalbank Village microshelter community will be relocated to the SPARC site. This move not only ensures the continuity of Coalbank Village's services but also positions SPARC as a regional hub for emergency and transitional housing.

Long-Term Vision and Expanded Regional Capacity

As the SPARC Community evolves, future phases will enhance its capacity to serve as a comprehensive housing and services ecosystem.

- 1. **Tiny House Community**: The development will add over 100 shelter and transitional housing beds, including a **Tiny House Community**. These homes will provide residents with privacy, independence, and a crucial stepping stone to permanent housing. Combined with supportive services, this community will foster stability and self-sufficiency.
- 2. Senior Housing Options: Future phases will also include permanent housing units for seniors, addressing the increasing need for affordable, stable housing among Coos County's aging population.
- 3. **Navigation Center Services**: As a central hub for the SPARC Network, the site will house outreach and navigation services that connect individuals to housing, employment, and healthcare resources throughout Coos and Curry counties.

Consolidation of Services and Community Impact

The SPARC site's design will streamline access to supportive services by centralizing them in one location. This model enhances coordination among service providers, reduces inefficiencies, and ensures residents have the resources they need to achieve long-term stability.

• Health and Stability: Partnerships with Coos Health and Wellness, The Salvation Army, and other local organizations will bring mental health support, behavioral health services, and job training directly to the community.

- **Employment Pathways**: Workforce participation will be prioritized through on-site training programs and employment readiness services, creating clear pathways to economic independence.
- Efficient Resource Use: Centralizing services at the SPARC site will reduce duplication, optimize resource allocation, and increase the overall impact on the community.

Regional Benefits and Collaborative Impact

• Shelter and Housing Continuum: By integrating emergency shelter beds, transitional housing, and permanent housing options, SPARC provides a comprehensive pathway from crisis to stability.



• Regional Collaboration: Partnerships with organizations like Brookings CORE Response and ORCCA will expand the reach of SPARC's services into neighboring Curry County, ensuring a unified response to regional homelessness.

• Economic and Workforce Development: By addressing housing shortages, the SPARC Community supports workforce retention, particularly for essential sectors like healthcare and education.

Operations: Leadership and Expertise

The Salvation Army (TSA) will manage day-to-day operations at the SPARC site, leveraging its expertise in shelter management and service delivery to ensure a high-quality resident experience. In collaboration with **Southern Oregon Coast Regional Housing (SOCRH)**, TSA will create a seamless operational framework that prioritizes:

- 1. **Resident Dignity**: Cultivating a compassionate and secure environment where individuals and families can regain stability.
- 2. **Comprehensive Care**: Integrating housing with services that address physical, mental, and financial health needs.
- 3. **Regional Support**: Extending resources to Coos and Curry counties until a dedicated site can be developed for Curry.

Key Benefits of Tiny House Communities and Rural Navigation Centers

Tiny house communities, combined with navigation center services, represent a sustainable and effective response to rural homelessness:

- Affordable and Sustainable Design: Tiny homes offer low-cost housing with reduced environmental impacts, making them ideal for rural regions like Coos County.

Sustainability and Funding Model

The SPARC Community's sustainability will be ensured through a **braided funding model** that includes:

- Medicaid Billing for reimbursable services.
- **CoC Grants** for shelter operations and housing stabilization.
- Commercial Revenue from rental spaces.

- Federal and State Grants from HUD, OHCS, and others.
- **Tiny Home Revenue** reinvested into operations.



By employing a hub-and-spoke framework, SPARC ensures equitable distribution of services, reducing the overreliance on any single area and creating a responsive, adaptable system of care tailored to the needs of rural communities.

At the heart of the SPARC Network is Belloni Ranch, the central hub providing emergency shelter, transitional housing, and essential supportive services. Satellite sites such as Hope Village, Woodland Apartments, North Bend Family Housing, and other community sites extend SPARC's reach, forming a Continuum of Care to support individuals and families across all stages of stability. Integrating the Office of Homeless Response (OHR) with the Devereux Center ensures that outreach and shelter services remain accessible and effective, while the transfer of the Devereux Center's 501(c)(3) nonprofit status to OHR strengthens the administrative backbone of the SPARC Network.



This strategy addresses critical housing shortages and fosters sustainable economic development and community revitalization. By redistributing services and reducing the overconcentration of homeless support facilities in the Empire District, SPARC revitalizes historically impacted areas while empowering all communities within Coos County to contribute to the solution. Through strategic partnerships, resource coordination, and a focus on systemic change, the SPARC Network ensures that every resident has access to decent, safe, and affordable housing.

Core Components of the SPARC Network

1. Belloni Ranch – Primary Service Hub

Belloni Ranch serves as the core of SPARC's network, acting as the main point for emergency shelter, transitional housing, and service coordination.

Key Services:

- Emergency shelter beds and Pallet Shelters for immediate, low-barrier housing options.
- FEMA-required relocation site for Coalbank Village, consolidating emergency services in a safe, flood-free location.





The **Service Providers and Regional Connections (SPARC) Network** is a catalyst for transformation in Coos County, addressing the housing crisis and strengthening the social and economic fabric of the community. By integrating housing solutions with supportive services, SPARC creates a **Continuum of Care** that empowers residents to move from crisis to stability and independence.

Key Impacts of SPARC in Coos County:

- 1. Expanding Housing Accessibility
 - North Bend Family Housing: Adds 176 affordable units, including 20 Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) units and 30 Project-Based Voucher (PBV) units, directly addressing the regional housing shortage.
 - **Empire District Revitalization:** Revitalizes the Empire District with up to 108 modernized affordable units, transitional housing at Hope Village, and workforce housing to support local employees.
 - **Belloni Ranch SPARC Community:** Establishes a centralized hub for emergency shelter, transitional housing, and integrated services, providing a crucial bridge for residents transitioning to permanent housing.

2. Improving Community Health and Stability

- Collaboration with partners like Coos Health and Wellness and ADAPT embeds mental health, substance use treatment, and family support services into housing developments.
- Projects align with the **Advanced Health Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)**, ensuring housing solutions address social determinants of health and promote wellness.

3. Strengthening Economic Stability

- Workforce housing developments, such as the 2.5-acre parcel at the Empire District, provide affordable homeownership opportunities for essential workers, stabilizing the local economy.
- Housing stability reduces workforce turnover and supports local businesses, creating a more resilient economy.

4. Creating Sustainable Housing Models

- Integration of **Community Land Trust (CLT)** models ensures long-term affordability and preserves housing for future generations.
- Energy-efficient upgrades, like those planned for the Airport Heights and Powers Housing Developments, reduce environmental impact and lower costs for residents and housing providers.

5. Decentralizing Services

 By redistributing services across the county, SPARC reduces overreliance on urban centers and ensures equitable access for rural and underserved communities, fostering a more balanced and inclusive system of care.

a peer-run 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization based in Brookings, Oregon, dedicated to enhancing community well-being through comprehensive support services. CORE's mission is to strengthen the entire community through outreach, education, and advocacy, with a focus on assisting individuals



experiencing homelessness, housing instability, and other social challenges. Their peer-led approach ensures that services are delivered by individuals with lived experience, fostering trust and relatability with clients.

Mission and Vision

- **Mission**: To strengthen the whole community through outreach, education, and advocacy.
- **Vision**: To create a supportive environment where all community members have access to the resources and opportunities they need to thrive.

Key Programs and Services

CORE offers a range of peer-led services designed to address the diverse needs of the community:

By leveraging a decentralized hub-and-spoke model, SPARC ensures services are distributed effectively to rural and underserved communities across Curry County.

This approach goes beyond temporary solutions, offering a cohesive continuum of care that integrates emergency shelter, transitional housing, and permanent supportive housing with essential wrap-around services. Through collaboration with regional partners, SPARC empowers individuals and families to achieve housing stability while fostering health equity and community resilience.

With a strong network of providers and strategic developments under its umbrella, SPARC is setting the foundation for long-term solutions that address homelessness and housing insecurity at their roots.

Services in Curry County

Curry County is home to a diverse network of service providers dedicated to addressing homelessness, housing instability, and related support needs. These organizations form the backbone of the SPARC Network, creating a collaborative system to meet the needs of individuals and families at every stage of their journey toward stability and self-sufficiency.

Brookings CORE Response

Brookings CORE Response is a peer-led organization offering comprehensive services to address homelessness and housing instability. Their programs include:

- **Street Outreach**: Engaging unsheltered individuals to provide immediate assistance and connect them with resources.
- Emergency Shelter: Offering short-term shelter solutions to those in immediate need.
- Housing-Focused Case Management: Assisting individuals in securing stable housing by addressing barriers such as employment, health, and financial challenges.
- **Peer House Services**: Providing essential support, such as internet access, mail services, hygiene products, and a safe space to connect with community resources.
- **Mobile Outreach Units**: Delivering healthcare, food, and case management to rural and geographically isolated areas.
- Low-Income Housing Development: Developing affordable housing units, including the upcoming Gold Beach RV Park project, which will provide transitional housing.

St. Timothy's Episcopal Church

St. Timothy's Episcopal Church addresses food insecurity and basic needs for individuals and families experiencing homelessness or financial hardship. Key services include:

• Soup Kitchen: Serving over 200 hot meals weekly, ensuring no one goes hungry.

- Laundry and Shower Facilities: Providing essential hygiene support to individuals without stable housing.
- **Mailing Services**: Offering a secure mailing address for individuals without a permanent residence.
- **Community Engagement**: Hosting community gardens and other initiatives to foster connections and self-reliance.

Adapt

Adapt is the Mental Health Authority and SUD provider for Curry County. Adapt integrates behavioral health and substance use treatment into the housing continuum, ensuring that individuals facing complex challenges can access the support they need. Services include:

- Mental Health Services: Counseling and therapy tailored to individuals' needs.
- Substance Use Treatment: Programs aimed at addressing addiction and promoting recovery.
- **Partnerships**: Working alongside other SPARC Network providers to ensure coordinated care and support.

Coos-Curry Housing Authority

The Coos-Curry Housing Authority plays a vital role in managing and developing affordable housing solutions for Curry County residents. Their contributions include:

- Affordable Housing Development: Developing permanent housing sites such as the Ellensburg development in Gold Beach.

Under Development and Proposed SPARC Sites in Curry County


Gold Beach RV Park – Transitional Shelter Village

- Operator: Brookings CORE Response
- Overview: Gold Beach RV Park is being re-envisioned as a transitional shelter village to address immediate housing needs for vulnerable populations in Curry County. Operated by Brookings CORE Response, this site will integrate supportive services with flexible, transitional housing solutions.
- Key Features:
 - 20 RV spaces dedicated to transitional housing, accommodating program participants from Brookings CORE.

- Partnership with St. Timothy's Episcopal Church and Adapt to provide wrap-around services, including mental health and substance use treatment.
- Options for long-term operational control through master leasing or acquisition by Brookings CORE.

Services Offered:

- Housing-focused case management, employment support, and access to health services.
- Pathways to permanent housing options within the SPARC Network, ensuring a continuum of care for residents.
- Impact: Provides a muchneeded bridge between emergency shelters and permanent housing, offering a stable environment for individuals and families on their path to long-term housing solutions.



The Green Boxes on the bottom represent the Veterans Housing project at Brookings CORE Response and the other is the Gold Beach RV Park. The owner wants to transition the site from a vacation site to long term and transitional housing that would be operated by a service provider. In 2021 Oregon revised its OAR's to allow for RV Parks to act as longer-term residencies. He would like to take advantage of that OAR.

Ellensburg Site (Gold Beach) – Permanent Affordable Housing

- **Operator**: Coos-Curry Housing Authority
- Overview: The Ellensburg site will be developed into a 26-unit affordable housing complex serving seniors, individuals with disabilities, and families. This project, led by Coos-Curry Housing Authority, will likely utilize HOME funds from Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS) with Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) dollars and Project-Based Vouchers (PBVs) to ensure both financial and operational support for tenants.
- Key Features:
 - Collaboration with Adapt and Coos-Curry Housing Authority to prioritize housing for residents transitioning from other SPARC Network sites.

- On-site spaces for community partners to deliver critical services, reducing barriers for residents to access supportive programs.
- Services Offered:
 - Long-term affordable housing solutions with integrated housing



stabilization programs and supportive services tailored to tenant needs.

Courage Lane Cottages (Brookings) – Transitional Housing and Veterans Housing

- **Operator**: Brookings CORE Response
- Overview: Courage Lane Cottages will provide transitional housing specifically for veterans and vulnerable populations, operating as a





critical component of the SPARC Network. Managed by Brookings CORE Response, it will complement other transitional services, such as the Gold Beach RV Park.

- Key Features:
 - Collaborative partnerships with Adapt and St. Timothy's Episcopal Church to offer on-site case management and supportive services.
 - Clear pathways for residents to transition into permanent housing options, including units at the Ellensburg site.



- Services Offered:
 - Focused support for veterans and high-barrier populations, helping them achieve stability and self-reliance through wrap-around services and housing solutions.

Mobile Outreach Units and Community Resource Centers

- **Operator**: Brookings CORE Response
- **Overview**: Brookings CORE Response will operate mobile units that extend essential services to rural and remote areas, addressing the unique challenges of geographically isolated communities.
- Key Features:
 - Delivery of critical services, including healthcare, food distribution, and case management.
 - Expanded access for residents in underserved areas who cannot travel to centralized locations.
- **Impact**: By bringing services directly to those in need, the mobile units strengthen community resilience and reduce service inequities across Curry County.

Sites Needed

South County Tiny House Village – Needed Services

- **Operator**: Brookings CORE Response/St. Timothy's
- **Overview**: A proposed development to address the acute need for transitional housing in South Curry County.
- Key Features:
 - Construction of 10–15 tiny homes to provide temporary shelter for individuals and families.
 - On-site case management and supportive services tailored to housing stabilization, employment readiness, and self-sufficiency.
 - Collaborative partnerships with Brookings CORE Response, Adapt, and local service providers to enhance operational capacity.
- **Impact**: This site will expand the regional capacity to serve underserved populations in South Curry County, offering a scalable solution to meet increasing housing demands.

Brookings – Affordable Housing Development

• **Operator**: Coos-Curry Housing Authority

- **Overview**: Coos-Curry Housing Authority recognizes a pressing need to acquire and develop a site for affordable housing units in Brookings, addressing the lack of affordable rental housing in South Curry County.
- Key Features:
 - Expansion of the Housing Authority's portfolio to include Brookings, complementing its existing affordable housing developments in Port Orford and Gold Beach.
 - A focus on creating mixed-income housing solutions that meet the needs of low- and moderate-income households while contributing to the local economy.
- **Impact**: This development will fill a critical gap in the housing continuum, ensuring South Curry County residents have access to stable, affordable housing options and enhancing the capacity of the SPARC Network.

The SPARC Network relies on a strong network of regional partners to ensure seamless transitions from shelter to stable housing. These partnerships are essential to providing comprehensive services, addressing housing instability, and fostering community resilience in Curry County.

Key SPARC Partners

• Brookings CORE Response

Provides housing-focused case management, emergency shelter, and resource navigation services while spearheading mobile outreach initiatives to reach rural and underserved communities.

• St. Timothy's Episcopal Church

Addresses food insecurity and basic needs through its soup kitchen, laundry vouchers, mailing address services, and community engagement programs that promote self-reliance.

- **Medicaid Reimbursements**: Generates consistent funding for Adapt's Medicaid-eligible mental health and behavioral health services at SPARC locations.

Gaps and Strategies in Housing and Support Services

Addressing the housing crisis on the South Coast requires targeted, collaborative efforts to bridge critical gaps in housing models and integrate innovative, evidence-based approaches like the Clubhouse Model. The region's unique challenges, including a lack of affordable housing, limited resources for mental health and recovery services, and insufficient transitional and re-entry housing options, necessitate a multifaceted and strategic response. By focusing on these gaps and implementing creative solutions, we can build a more connected and resilient system of care that supports individuals at every stage of their housing and recovery journey.

The integration of innovative models like the Clubhouse not only complements traditional housing approaches but also fosters a sense of community and empowerment. Such models address the root causes of instability—such as mental health challenges, unemployment, and social isolation—by providing a holistic framework of support. This ensures that individuals and families are not just housed but are equipped with the resources and connections they need to thrive.

These strategies are designed to enhance the SPARC framework by creating a more interconnected Continuum of Care. They align emergency shelters, transitional housing, and permanent supportive housing with essential services such as mental health care, employment training, and peer support. Together, these elements work to break cycles of homelessness and instability, empowering individuals and strengthening the social fabric of the South Coast. By adopting these approaches, the SPARC framework will not only address immediate needs but also build long-term resilience, ensuring that every resident has the opportunity for a stable and fulfilling life.

Gaps in Housing and Services

Shared Housing Models

- Oxford Houses: Provide structured, peer-supported housing for individuals recovering from addiction. The South Coast lacks sufficient Oxford Houses to meet demand, leaving many without stable recovery housing.
- Recovery Housing: Housing focused on individuals exiting treatment programs remains limited, despite the clear need for supportive, substance-free environments.
- Mental Health Housing: With 6% of Coos County adults facing severe



mental health challenges, housing that includes mental health services is critically needed to reduce hospitalizations and homelessness.

• **Re-entry Housing**: Those transitioning out of incarceration face high risks of homelessness due to a lack of re-entry housing options, which increases recidivism and destabilizes communities.

Strategies to Address Housing Gaps

- 1. Develop and Expand Shared Housing Models
 - Partner with established networks like Oxford House and recovery-focused organizations to create additional housing opportunities.
 - Secure funding through Community Land Trust (CLT) initiatives to preserve and develop affordable shared housing.

2. Integrate Mental Health Housing with Services

- Develop Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) tailored for individuals with mental health challenges, ensuring access to on-site counselors and case management.
- Advocate for state and federal funding aimed at addressing the mental health housing crisis.

3. Collaborate on Re-entry Housing Initiatives

- Work with correctional facilities and re-entry programs to design housing solutions with wrap-around services such as workforce development and peer mentorship.
- Blend funding streams from local, state, and private sources to sustain re-entry housing projects.

- Identify a central location within a SPARC hub, such as North Bend or Belloni Ranch, to ensure accessibility.

3. Expand Through SPARC Hubs

 Embed the Clubhouse Model into SPARC's hub-and-spoke framework, creating a comprehensive support system that connects housing, mental health, and employment services.

Moving Forward

Integrating shared housing models and the Clubhouse Model into the SPARC framework ensures a more comprehensive and connected system to address the housing and mental health crises on the South Coast. These approaches not only fill service gaps but also provide transformative solutions that can be

scaled and replicated across the region. By working collaboratively, we can build a future where every individual has access to stable housing, meaningful work, and a supportive community.

New Strategy: Creating the South Coast Landlord Stewardship Initiative (SCLSI)

A key gap in current rental assistance programs managed by multiple agencies is the lack of a unified strategy to engage and support private landlords. The South Coast Landlord Stewardship **Initiative (SCLSI)** is a proposed solution that would need to be developed to address this challenge. SCLSI aims to unlock the private rental market by providing landlords with financial incentives, risk mitigation tools, and a dedicated support system, ensuring their active participation in programs like



Housing Choice Vouchers (HCV) and Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH).

The creation of SCLSI would involve establishing a **Landlord Liaison** role to serve as a steward across agencies, offering streamlined communication in the marketing of programs. Pairing this with tenant stabilization strategies—like housing readiness education and wraparound case management—would ensure long-term success for both landlords and tenants.

Developing SCLSI would require cross-agency collaboration, startup funding, and stakeholder engagement to design and implement the initiative. By addressing landlord concerns and aligning rental assistance programs under a unified framework, SCLSI would significantly expand housing options, stabilize tenancies, and create a replicable model for strengthening housing systems in rural communities.

Conclusion

Addressing the housing crisis on the South Coast requires a holistic and innovative approach, integrating targeted strategies that bridge gaps in shared housing, mental health support, and re-entry programs while introducing scalable solutions like the **Clubhouse Model**. These evidence-based models not only address the immediate housing needs but also foster stability by providing pathways to employment, peer support, and recovery services that strengthen individuals and communities alike.

The addition of the **Regional Landlord Stewardship Initiative (RLSI)** presents a new opportunity to unlock the private rental market through collaboration and incentives. SPARC Network Structure and Implementation Plan

The SPARC Network is designed to foster collaboration among autonomous partners while maintaining their independence. The network strengthens each participant by providing shared resources, advocacy, and coordination, ensuring that every partner's unique mission is amplified rather than compromised.

Network Structure

- 1. Core Principles:
 - **Autonomy**: All partners retain their independence in their original organizational and decision-making authority.
 - **Collaboration**: Facilitate a unified approach to addressing housing and homelessness through shared goals.

 Communication will be facilitated through existing channels such as email, Zoom, and in-person meetings. No specialized communication system is required, ensuring ease of use and accessibility for all partners.

5. Outreach and Advocacy:

- 1. Develop a shared advocacy plan to engage policymakers and funders.
- 2. Publicize the network's vision and progress through coordinated messaging.

- **Month 1**: SPARC Summit convened; core partners onboarded.
- Month 6: SPARC Coordinating Body operational.
- Month 12: Initial shared initiatives underway.
- Month 18: Additional partners integrated; SPARC Board and specialized teams fully operational.
- Month 24: Network fully functional with scalable and replicable systems.
